

The Spiritual Practice of Dying in order to Live

In preparation for Sunday's sermon, I've been pondering death a lot. The message of Jesus in this week's Gospel of John can say to us that we are to develop the spiritual practice of dying throughout our life, so that we can truly live and enter into eternal life in the here and now. It seems to be one of Jesus' most defiant and rebellious statements, that which goes against the core of our desire for self-preservation, or against our culture's myth that we can stay young forever and that there would be value in that stagnation of our life process.


It seems to me the spiritual practice of dying to oneself, to one's preoccupations or one's obsessions or one's own perspectives or prejudices toward those who hold opposing opinions, or to one's fears or deepest pain is what the season of Lent is all about. For each time we die to what was and we allow ourselves to be recreated in the newness of the possibilities Jesus' death on the cross offers us, we are living more faithfully, exposing the truth of our real selves to ourselves, to each other and to God.

This spiritual practice of dying to ourselves is really hard work. It takes courage and companionship and guidance. It is my experience that God shows us exactly what we are to be dying to and also provides the strength and lightness to do this hard spiritual work. If you need a partner along the way, or someone to help you sort out

what it is that God is asking of you, please, let's set up a time for holy conversation.


